Joe Mason opened the meeting with a Karakia.

# 2. MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

#### Resolution (2/16)

(Moved: John Vaile; Seconded: Mary Molloy - carried)

# 4. COMMUNITY & PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATE

Claire Robertson, Community & Public Health, presented this update which included information on the following topics:

# **Community Nutrition**

An Appetite for Life course has now started in Westport at Number 37 (community house) and Community and Public Health staff recently met with a practice nurse in Reefton about providing a course there in the near future. There is a steady flow of referrals to Appetite for Life coming in from Hokitika and Greymouth as well. We are developing strategies to streamline our referral process and to enhance the overall experience of Appetite for Life.

Community and Public Health has been continuing work with six Early Childhood Centres to support the development of healthy kai policies and to provide support to teachers and parents around children's nutrition. The early childhood setting will be a strong focus of our work in nutrition over the next year.

# **Alcohol Licensing**

Community and Public Health's alcohol licensing staff continue to report on alcohol licence applications. One application of particular note was opposed by the Medical Officer of Health during February. This was an application for a new off-licence store in Hokitika, a town which already has one off-licence for every 423 people. Should this application be granted, it would mean that there would be one off-licence for every 371 people in Hokitika. The comparable ratio for Greymouth is one off-licence for every 1154 people and for Westport it is one for every 1009. Increased density of alcohol outlets has been shown to correlate with increased alcohol harm and the Westland District already has the highest rates of several types of alcohol-related harm of all West Coast districts. This application will go to a hearing of the Westland District Licensing Committee late next month.

Community and Public Health staff have met with the Hokitika Wildfoods Festival Coordinator to discuss the event on 12 March 2016. This year there will again be a live band performance at the Festival grounds on Saturday evening. CPH staff, along with Police and the Westland Licensing Inspector will be monitoring at the Festival and during the evening.

# Kaumātua Wellbeing Hui

Community and Public Health have been working with our partners to organise kaumātua wellbeing hui for 2016 at Arahura marae. These hui encourage and support kaumātua as whanau health promoters. Kaumātua have identified their areas of interest for the upcoming hui.

The first hui will be an influenza vaccination clinic on 23 March supported by the Westland Medical Centre, Poutini Waiora and the West Coast PHO. Westland Pharmacy staff will also be in attendance to talk about medications, blister packs, and how to access funding for certain medications.

The second hui will on 6 April and will be on Alzheimer's and Dementia. This hui is will be supported by Anne Marie Reynolds, West Coast field worker from Alzheimers Canterbury, Robyn Naish, Dementia Educator and Dr Michele Dhanak from the Complex Clinical Care Network, as well as staff of Poutini Waiora and the West Coast PHO.

### Smoke-free Enforcement

Community and Public Health conducted a tobacco Controlled Purchase Operation in the Buller and Grey Districts over a two day period in February with the help of a 15 year old volunteer, the Christchurch Smoke-free Officer and a Ministry of Health representative. Shops were visited in Westport, Carters Beach, Reefton, Ikamatua, Ahaura, Moana, Blackball and Greymouth. We are pleased to report that no sales were made to the volunteer.

# **Relay For Life**

Members of the West Coast Tobacco Free Coalition attended the Cancer Society's Relay for Life held at the Greymouth High School grounds from 10am - 11pm on Saturday 20th February. There were twelve teams taking part this year. We had a smokefree gazebo with information and resources to support people wanting to quit smoking or to continue to live smokefree. We were also promoting smokefree cars. Three people made appointments with the Smoking Cessation Counsellor during the day and there were other positive discussions about quitting smoking.

# Ministry of Health Tobacco Realignment

A Request for Proposal (RFP), as part of the Ministry of Health Tobacco Realignment – Regional/Local Stop Smoking Services process was submitted to the Ministry in mid-February by Community and Public Health. The proposal was developed through the West Coast Alliance structure, under the auspices of the Healthy West Coast Governance Group. A working group supported the development of the proposal which included key stakeholders from the areas of smokefree, Māori health and mental health. The process provided the West Coast health system with an opportunity to develop and propose a service that:

- i. is a culturally appropriate and suitably skilled stop smoking programme providing evidence-based medication and face-to-face, flexible behavioural support to Māori and other priority population groups; and
- ii. allows a means of improving recruitment and engagement of 'hard to reach'/'hard to engage' people who want to stop smoking within these priority population groups.

Community and Public Health is expecting to hear the outcome of the RFP later in March, with the current Aukati Kaipaipa contract finishing 30 June 2016.

Discussion took place regarding the Healthy Food Environments Policy and the Committee noted that the West Coast DHB is working at a national level with other DHBs towards ensuring a policy is in place by 30 June 2016. It was also noted that whilst the policy must be in place by 30 June this will not necessarily mean that the policy will be fully implemented by then.

The report was noted.

# 5. PLANNING & FUNDING UPDATE

Phil Wheble, Team Leader, Planning and Funding, presented this report which provided the Committee with an update on progress made on the Minister of Health's health and disability priorities and the West Coast DHBs Annual Plan key priority areas as follows:

### **Key Achievements**

- The West Coast DHB continues to achieve 99.7% of patients admitted, discharged or transferred from Grey Base ED within six hours during January 2016. An impressive 96% were seen within just four hours.
- West Coast DHB was 19 discharges ahead of our year-to-date progress target toward delivering 1,889 elective and arranged purchase unit code (PUC) discharges in the 2015/16 financial year.
- CCCN staff ensured 95% of people over 65 years receiving long term home based supports had an InterRAI assessment and an appropriate restorative care plan, meeting the target.

# Key Issues & Associated Remedies

• Four neurology patients are showing as non-compliant against the maximum 120 days' wait time target for First Specialist Assessment (ESPI 2) in December. Two Orthopaedics patients are showing as non-compliant against their first specialist assessment to surgical treatment (ESPI 5) in December. All patients have either since been seen, referred to their GP or now have an appointment.

- West Coast DHB has delivered B4 School Checks to 30% of the total eligible population and 27% of the high deprivation population against the 53% year-to-date target. There were no B4 School check clinics in January as these have proved to have very high DNA rates previously. The B4 Schools team has planned clinics for the remainder of the year and are confident in their ability to achieve the year-end target.
- West Coast health practitioners have reported giving 4,315 smokers cessation advice in the 15 months ending December 2015. This represents 84.8% of smokers enrolled with the PHO, against our 90% target. We are disappointed to see the monthly Karo data trend continue downward. All best practices continue.

Discussion took place regarding reporting of mental health data and the Committee noted that this data has temporarily been deleted from the report as it does not contain the latest information. It is hoped that a new Health Solution System will be implemented by June. This will show current information however historical information will be input after that date.

The report was noted.

# 6. ALLIANCE UPDATE

Phil Wheble, Team Leader, Planning & Funding, presented this report which was taken as read. The following information was provided on progress made around the West Coast Alliance:

# Alliance Leadership Team (ALT)

Over the last few months the Alliance workstreams have been developing the draft workplans for the coming financial year. This work will be reviewed by the Alliance Leadership at a meeting to be held tonight (10 March 2016).

### Health of Older Persons

Work is continuing Allied Health and District Nursing to identify and enable a supported discharge response for people over 65 years across the West Coast.

Agreement has been reached regarding the implementation of payment for home based carers to ensure that travel between clients is paid for.

# Grey/Westland & Buller Family Health Services (IFHS)

- In Greymouth both High Street Medical and RAGP (Rural Academic General Practice) have extended hours once a week each to provide greater primary care access in Grey.
- Other work underway includes looking at opportunities to move minor plastics work currently conducted by our specialist team into primary care.

# Healthy West Coast (HWC)

- A submission has been made to the RFP for Local Stop Smoking Services by Community & Public Health, on behalf of HWC and ALT. An outcome is expected by late March and will provide certainty on direction for local cessation services and the Māori Cessation Plan in particular.
- Green Prescription is expanding its group service provision with a new "Be Active" programme starting in Hokitika in May. Group programmes continue to be available in Grey and Buller.

# Child and Youth

- The new Kawatiri provider contract has been confirmed.
- CAMHS, PACT and the PHO Mental Health team are working closely to triage new referrals for Mental Health support and ensure young people are directed to the most appropriate service.

- A workshop has been held to bring together the workforce providing Well Child Tamariki Ora services to review progress and next steps towards a fully integrated West Coast Well Child Service

### Pharmacy

- Buller Pharmacy has agreed on a plan to participate in practice meetings to build relationships with practice staff. This should enable prescribing quality issues to be addressed. Involvement in individual patient management can be phased in later, including participation in the CCCN.

The report was noted.

# 7. HEALTH TARGET REPORT - Q2 2015/16

Philip Wheble, Team Leader, Planning & Funding, presented this report which was taken as read. He made particular mention of the Faster Cancer Treatment target which sits at 71.4%. The Committee noted that the DHB is working across the South Island with the Southern Cancer Network around this.

In regard to immunisation the Committee noted that the DHB will continue to struggle with this target due to the high opt-offs in the area.

It was also noted that the PHO are working hard on the help for smokers to quit target.

The report was noted.

# 8. MAORI HEALTH PLAN UPDATE

Kylie Parkin, Acting General Manager, Maori Health, presented this report which was taken as read. She commented in particular on the Mum4Mum courses currently being held. The Committee noted that Mum4Mums visit the maternity ward daily to offer any support for mum's with breastfeeding and are available for ongoing support and advice when they are back home.

The Committee also noted that Maori still continue to show a good rate of access to Diabetes Annual Reviews.

The Update was noted.

# 9. WEST COAST DHB DISABILITY ACTION PLAN

Kathy O'Neill, Disability Lead, Planning & Funding, presented the Disability Action Plan to the Committee for recommendation to the Board for approval.

The Committee noted that it is proposed to refresh the process annually to ensure the priority areas are constantly addressed.

The Committee also noted that there has been a lot of mental health and consumer input into the plan.

Discussion took place regarding the group tasked with the oversight of the implementation and it was agreed that this should be a small focus group.

### Resolution (3/16)

(Moved: Michelle Lomax; Seconded: Lynette Beirne - carried)

That the Community & Public Health and Disability Support Advisory Committee recommends to the Board that they:

- i. approve the Strategic Disability Action Plan with Priority Actions for 2016/17; and
- ii. approve the proposed governance structure and implementation of the priority actions.

### 10. DRAFT WEST COAST PUBLIC HEALTH ANNUAL PLAN 2016/17

Cheryl Brunton, Community & Public Health, presented the draft West Coast Public Health Annual Plan to the Committee for recommendation to the Board for approval.

The Committee noted that this will become part of the DHBs overall Annual Planning documents.

A query was made as to where breast feeding fitted into the plan and it was noted that this is not a contract that Community & Public Health have with the Ministry so it is not included in this document.

### Resolution (4/16)

(Moved: Lynette Beirne; Seconded: Mary Molloy - carried) (Michelle Lomax abstained from voting) That the Community & Public Health and Disability Support Advisory Committee recommend to the Board that they:

i. Endorse the draft West Coast DHB Public Health Annual Plan 2016/17.

### **11. GENERAL BUSINESS**

Lynette Beirne advised the Committee of the *Manawnaui in Charge* public meeting taking place on 16 March 10am – 11.30am. The meeting is about individualised care packages for people with disabilities.

Elinor Stratford advised that she had attended the opening of the Enable New Zealand EASIE (Equipment, Advice, Services, Information, Education) Living Centre in Palmerston North. This is the latest innovation from Enable New Zealand which is a gathering place for people with a disability and the elderly – it is their centre.

# REPORT to WCDHB CPHAC/DSAC COMMUNITY AND PUBLIC HEALTH (CPH)

# April 2016

# AgFest

A CPH staff member worked with West Coast PHO staff and other health professionals at the Men's Health Tent at AgFest, which was held on Friday 15 and Saturday 16 April at Cass Square in Hokitika. There was a very pleasing response from men to having a health check including blood pressure and blood sugar. There were also a large number of West Coast farmers who received a free influenza vaccination. Information and support was also available about smoking cessation and mental wellbeing. This event was very worthwhile and a great opportunity to engage with people who are not always regular users of health services.

### Franz Josef Flood Event

CPH were involved in the emergency response to recent Franz Josef flooding event, with a particular focus on potential public health issues arising from damage to the sewage ponds and diesel storage. Our staff have also been involved in working with staff from West Coast Regional Council and Westland District Council to ensure these issues are addressed in the recovery phase. CPH staff also attended a debrief with other agencies involved in the event.

### **Council Annual Plan Submissions**

CPH staff are currently working on submissions to three West Coast council Draft Annual Plans, and have already made a submission on the Grey District Council's draft plan. CPH has also facilitated the Active West Coast submission for the Greymouth District Council.

### **Alcohol Licensing**

Two weeks prior to the Hokitika Wildfoods Festival CPH staff met separately with the operators of the Beer Tent and the operators of the Wine Tent at the festival and briefed them on their responsibilities in respect to the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act 2012. CPH staff also attended the Wildfoods Festival on 12 March 2016 prior to the opening of the gates to the public and briefed staff at each of the four licensed stalls on their responsibilities under the Act. Joint monitoring of the alcohol sales from licensed stalls was conducted by CPH licensing staff, the Police and Westland's liquor licensing inspector, both during the day and during the live band performance at the venue during the evening. In addition, we monitored the camping grounds set up for the festival and the licensed premises in and around Hokitika during the night and in the early hours of the following morning.

CPH arranged a meeting with the West Coast Fire Service Safety Officer and secured his involvement in the assessment of all West Coast liquor licence applications. The Fire Safety Officer will ensure that all premises have an up to date approved evacuation plan.

# Kaumātua Wellbeing Hui

The recent kaumātua wellbeing project hui was focused on Dementia and Alzheimer's, as this was of particular interest to the kaumātua involved. Alzheimers NZ and the WCDHB both presented at the hui, with over 30 kaumātua present.

CPH also attended two recent health hui organised by Poutini Waiora in Greymouth and Hokitika. This included delivery of a Tai Chi class and providing resources and support around smoking cessation and healthy eating.

### **DHB Healthy Food and Drink Policy**

The final draft of the nationally aligned DHB Healthy Food and Drink Policy has been developed through the national DHB food and beverage environments network. The policy has been informed by the NZ Eating and Activity Guidelines (2015), National Heart Foundation guidelines for healthy cafeteria food and the Health Star Rating for packaged goods. The Ministry of Health has been leading the consultation on this document with key national stakeholders such as unions and food services, while CPH has been leading the consultation with local stakeholders. This has included the WCDHB Executive Management Team, the Consumer Council, Healthy West Coast Governance Group (DHB, WCPHO, Poutini Waiora and CPH) and the local policy working group. The final document will be the minimum expectations for DHBs to meet, then the WCDHB will need to develop a WCDHB specific policy that is required to go through the local endorsement process by 30 June 2016.

# **Health Promoting Schools**

CPH coordinated the delivery of the 'Accelerating Equity' interactive workshop for schools and school partners at Grey High School this week. This is a follow on from the introductory workshop held in November 2015. Over 40 participants (including rangatahi) attended the workshop with representation from schools Coast-wide and school partners such as Homebuilders and Poutini Waiora. Schools were able to share the changes they had made since the previous workshop and this workshop enabled them to build on this and start designing specific actions around how to reduce inequity they have identified in their school community.



The Orthopaedic patients have been seen. The general surgery patient had their operation cancelled as the surgeon was unable to land due to weather; they are now rebooked.
- B4 school check results show 52% of our total eligible population and 41% of our high deprivation population have received their B4 School Check against our 68% year-to-date target for March 2016. The B4 Schools team have planned clinics for the remainder of the year and are confident in their ability to achieve the year-end target.
- West Coast health practitioners have reported giving 4,315 smokers cessation advice in the 15 months ending December 2015. This represents 84.8% of smokers enrolled with the PHO, against our 90% target. We are disappointed to see the monthly Karo data trend continue downward. All best practices continue.

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


# Mental Health

### Achievements / Issues of Note

Work has commenced to provide better overall health care to people with enduring mental health issues. 




- Expenditure Trend - Rolling average



### 3. SUMMARY

Progress of Note:

### Alliance Leadership Team (ALT)

The Alliance Leadership Team reviewed the workplan for expanding the use of Telehealth across the coast and the accompanying reports demonstrating the percentage of patients having appointments via telehealth. The ALT noted the amount of work needed to get to this point.

The ALT reviewed the final drafts of the workstream workplans for 2016/17 Annual Planning. It was noted that the plans are very full and a there was a note of caution that the workstream be realistic in their expectations of themselves.

The ALT noted that nutrition and physical activity services are at risk due to reduced revenue from MoH. The ALT are concerned about this risk in the context of the both National strategies and the South Island Alliance plans. Planning & Funding and the Alliance Support Group (ASG) have been tasked to look at how we can move resources within the health system to address this issue.

### Health of Older Persons

• The CCCN has appointed a Falls Champion to deliver the falls programme in people's homes coast wide.

### Grey/Westland & Buller Family Health Services (IFHS)

- A telehealth distance mapping report has been completed and the Alliance Leadership Team has provided feedback. The report will be provided monthly to support discussion about opportunities to use telehealth in our health system. The Grey | Westland workstream has also selected a group to progress actions around common processes between Grey practices as well as between the practices and other providers such as pharmacies.
- In Buller, Māori with Long term Conditions have been identified, with work underway to improve the LTCM of all enrolled patients who are LTC2.
- Poutini Waiora have developed an evaluation for the spirometry project and it is anticipated that this will be completed during April.

• With Buller Medical fully staffed, evening clinics are planned and additional health promotion and prevention activities are under consideration.

### Healthy West Coast (HWC)

- The outcome of the submission made to the RFP for Local Stop Smoking Services by CPH (Community & Public Health), on behalf of HWC and ALT has again been delayed. This was expected by late March but MoH have advised this will now be more likely late April. The final decision will provide certainty on direction for local cessation services and the Māori Cessation Plan in particular.
- Notification from MoH about reducing funding to the DHB for Nutrition and Physical Activity services has put these at risk. HWC will again reprioritise services and work to maintain as much service provision as possible. However, a long term plan regarding how to continue to fund public health needs to be developed.

### Child and Youth

- The PHO have launched their new youth west coast website to support youth mental health after consultation with young people and user testing.
- GoFlo (Hip Hop / Poetry) workshops have commenced across the coast with 11-17 year olds themed around solutions to the specific issues raised in the Girls of Concern report. Young participants are encouraged to write songs as a medium for expressing those ideas.

### Pharmacy

- Market analysis for the Grey IFHC community pharmacy commercial arrangements has commenced.
- o Buller Pharmacy participation in the local interdisciplinary team meetings has commenced.

# ITEMS OF INTEREST FOR THE BOARD

# a) COMMUNITY AND PUBLIC HEALTH UPDATE

This report was provided to the Committee with updates as follows:

### **Community Nutrition**

An Appetite for Life course has now started in Westport at Number 37 (community house) and Community and Public Health staff recently met with a practice nurse in Reefton about providing a course there in the near future. There is a steady flow of referrals to Appetite for Life coming in from Hokitika and Greymouth as well. We are developing strategies to streamline our referral process and to enhance the overall experience of Appetite for Life.

Community and Public Health has been continuing work with six Early Childhood Centres to support the development of healthy kai policies and to provide support to teachers and parents around children's nutrition. The early childhood setting will be a strong focus of our work in nutrition over the next year.

# **Alcohol Licensing**

Community and Public Health's alcohol licensing staff continue to report on alcohol licence applications. One application of particular note was opposed by the Medical Officer of Health during February. This was an application for a new off-licence store in Hokitika, a town which already has one off-licence for every 423 people. Should this application be granted, it would mean that there would be one off-licence for every 371 people in Hokitika. The comparable ratio for Greymouth is one off-licence for every 1154 people and for Westport it is one for every 1009. Increased density of alcohol outlets has been shown to correlate with increased alcohol harm and the Westland District already has the highest rates of several types of alcohol-related harm of all West Coast districts. This application will go to a hearing of the Westland District Licensing Committee late next month.

Community and Public Health staff have met with the Hokitika Wildfoods Festival Coordinator to discuss the event on 12 March 2016. This year there will again be a live band performance at the Festival grounds on Saturday evening. CPH staff, along with Police and the Westland Licensing Inspector will be monitoring at the Festival and during the evening.

# Kaumātua Wellbeing Hui

Community and Public Health have been working with our partners to organise kaumātua wellbeing hui for 2016 at Arahura marae. These hui encourage and support kaumātua as whanau health promoters. Kaumātua have identified their areas of interest for the upcoming hui.

The first hui will be an influenza vaccination clinic on 23 March supported by the Westland Medical Centre, Poutini Waiora and the West Coast PHO. Westland Pharmacy staff will also be in attendance to talk about medications, blister packs, and how to access funding for certain medications.

The second hui will on 6 April and will be on Alzheimer's and Dementia. This hui is will be supported by Anne Marie Reynolds, West Coast field worker from Alzheimers Canterbury, Robyn Naish, Dementia Educator and Dr Michele Dhanak from the Complex Clinical Care Network, as well as staff of Poutini Waiora and the West Coast PHO.

### Smoke-free Enforcement

Community and Public Health conducted a tobacco Controlled Purchase Operation in the Buller and Grey Districts over a two day period in February with the help of a 15 year old volunteer, the Christchurch Smoke-free Officer and a Ministry of Health representative. Shops were visited in Westport, Carters Beach, Reefton, Ikamatua, Ahaura, Moana, Blackball and Greymouth. We are pleased to report that no sales were made to the volunteer.

# **Relay For Life**

Members of the West Coast Tobacco Free Coalition attended the Cancer Society's Relay for Life held at the Greymouth High School grounds from 10am - 11pm on Saturday 20th February. There were twelve teams taking part this year. We had a smokefree gazebo with information and resources to support people wanting to quit smoking or to continue to live smokefree. We were also promoting smokefree cars. Three people made appointments with the Smoking Cessation Counsellor during the day and there were other positive discussions about quitting smoking.

### Ministry of Health Tobacco Realignment

A Request for Proposal (RFP), as part of the Ministry of Health Tobacco Realignment – Regional/Local Stop Smoking Services process was submitted to the Ministry in mid-February by Community and Public Health. The proposal was developed through the West Coast Alliance structure, under the auspices of the Healthy West Coast Governance Group. A working group supported the development of the proposal which included key stakeholders from the areas of smokefree, Māori health and mental health. The process provided the West Coast health system with an opportunity to develop and propose a service that:

- i. is a culturally appropriate and suitably skilled stop smoking programme providing evidence-based medication and face-to-face, flexible behavioural support to Māori and other priority population groups; and
- ii. allows a means of improving recruitment and engagement of 'hard to reach'/'hard to engage' people who want to stop smoking within these priority population groups.

Community and Public Health is expecting to hear the outcome of the RFP later in March, with the current Aukati Kaipaipa contract finishing 30 June 2016.

Discussion took place regarding the Healthy Food Environments Policy and the Committee noted that the West Coast DHB is working at a national level with other DHBs towards ensuring a policy is in place by 30 June 2016. It was also noted that whilst the policy must be in place by 30 June this will not necessarily mean that the policy will be fully implemented by then.

The report was noted.

# b) PLANNING & FUNDING UPDATE

Philip Wheble, Team Leader, Planning & Funding presented this update. Mr Wheble advised that in response to the request at the last meeting to make ethnicity more visible in reporting the team have been working to achieve this and it is a work in progress.

The report itself provided the Committee with an update on progress made on the Minister of Health's health and disability priorities and the West Coast DHBs Annual Plan key priority areas as follows:

### **Key Achievements**

- The West Coast DHB continues to achieve 99.7% of patients admitted, discharged or transferred from Grey Base ED within six hours during January 2016. An impressive 96% were seen within just four hours.
- West Coast DHB was 19 discharges ahead of our year-to-date progress target toward delivering 1,889 elective and arranged purchase unit code (PUC) discharges in the 2015/16 financial year.
- CCCN staff ensured 95% of people over 65 years receiving long term home based supports had an InterRAI assessment and an appropriate restorative care plan, meeting the target.

# Key Issues & Associated Remedies

- Four neurology patients are showing as non-compliant against the maximum 120 days' wait time target for First Specialist Assessment (ESPI 2) in December. Two Orthopaedics patients are showing as non-compliant against their first specialist assessment to surgical treatment (ESPI 5) in December. All patients have either since been seen, referred to their GP or now have an appointment.
- West Coast DHB has delivered B4 School Checks to 30% of the total eligible population and 27% of the high deprivation population against the 53% year-to-date target. There were no B4 School check clinics in January as these have proved to have very high DNA rates previously. The B4 Schools team has planned clinics for the remainder of the year and are confident in their ability to achieve the year-end target.
- West Coast health practitioners have reported giving 4,315 smokers cessation advice in the 15 months ending December 2015. This represents 84.8% of smokers enrolled with the PHO, against our 90% target. We are disappointed to see the monthly Karo data trend continue downward. All best practices continue.

Discussion took place regarding reporting of mental health data and the Committee noted that this data has temporarily been deleted from the report as it does not contain the latest information. It is hoped that a new Health Solution System will be implemented by June. This will show current information however historical information will be input after that date.

The report was noted.

# c) ALLIANCE UPDATE

This report provided an update of progress made around the West Coast Alliance regarding:

# Alliance Leadership Team (ALT)

Over the last few months the Alliance workstreams have been developing the draft workplans for the coming financial year. This work will be reviewed by the Alliance Leadership at a meeting to be held tonight (10 March 2016).

# Health of Older Persons

Work is continuing Allied Health and District Nursing to identify and enable a supported discharge response for people over 65 years across the West Coast.

Agreement has been reached regarding the implementation of payment for home based carers to ensure that travel between clients is paid for.

# Grey/Westland & Buller Family Health Services (IFHS)

- In Greymouth both High Street Medical and RAGP (Rural Academic General Practice) have extended hours once a week each to provide greater primary care access in Grey.
- Other work underway includes looking at opportunities to move minor plastics work currently conducted by our specialist team into primary care.

# Healthy West Coast (HWC)

 A submission has been made to the RFP for Local Stop Smoking Services by Community & Public Health, on behalf of HWC and ALT. An outcome is expected by late March and will provide certainty on direction for local cessation services and the Māori Cessation Plan in particular. • Green Prescription is expanding its group service provision with a new "Be Active" programme starting in Hokitika in May. Group programmes continue to be available in Grey and Buller.

# Child and Youth

- The new Kawatiri provider contract has been confirmed.
- CAMHS, PACT and the PHO Mental Health team are working closely to triage new referrals for Mental Health support and ensure young people are directed to the most appropriate service.
- A workshop has been held to bring together the workforce providing Well Child Tamariki Ora services to review progress and next steps towards a fully integrated West Coast Well Child Service

### Pharmacy

• Buller Pharmacy has agreed on a plan to participate in practice meetings to build relationships with practice staff. This should enable prescribing quality issues to be addressed. Involvement in individual patient management can be phased in later, including participation in the CCCN.

The report was noted.
